Public Lecture

Grounded in the Samoan notion of vā—a relational space that honours connection and reciprocity—my body centered practice recentres Moana-based protocols and epistemologies, through the creation of the Vā body and the SaVĀge Methodology. This SaVĀge methodology employs the tenants of Culti.VĀ.tion, FAB.rication, to Acti.VĀ.te people, spaces, and things. Presented through a constellation of performative actions, ceremonial gestures, archival imagery, soundscapes, spoken word, and moving image, this lecture unfolds as an embodied archive. As I draw from over 30 years of experience working across Aotearoa, the UK, Europe, and the Moana Nui-Pacific.

Workshop

The workshop explores how to work with corporeality and living archives. Its centres the malu, the Samoan female tattoo, as a living archive of cultural knowledge and ancestral presence. Through discussion, drawing, writing, and embodied practice, participants will explore how Indigenous knowledge is encoded in the body, and how these markings intersect with gender, identity, and sovereignty. Grounded in my own malu and artistic practice, the workshop invites critical reflection on issues of cultural appropriation, authorship, and the responsibilities of working with Indigenous visual systems.



Sistar S'pacific aka Rosanna Raymond is a leading voice in contemporary Moana art, activating cultural spaces across Aotearoa, the UK, Australia, and the USA. A founding member and lifetime President of the SaVĀge K'lub and long-standing of the arts collective Pacific Sisters, her body-centred practice spans museums, academia, and performance, engaging in institutional critique through art, adornment, and dialogue.







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
